2. Member Resources: Christine McPheter, Meade County

FCS Friend of Extension: Karen Blakeslee is the coordinator of the Kansas State University Rapid Response Center. The Center is a KSU Extension Agent resource for questions primarily relating to many aspects of food including food science, food safety, food preservation, food preparation and nutrition. The center receives over 1,500 requests a year with a response rate of 97% of questions answered within 24 hours. Along with these primary responsibilities, Karen is also webmaster for six web sites and co-coordinator of the KSU Master Food Volunteer program. She is active in the Institute of Food Technologists Extension Division and Epsilon Sigma Phi, an Extension fraternity.

Karen received her Bachelorøs degree in Food Science and Masterøs degree in Foods and Nutrition from Kansas State University. Other work experience includes over eleven years in food manufacturing from ice cream to cereals and pasta.

Since 1995, the Rapid Response Center at Kansas State University has provided support to on-campus Extension Specialists in the Food Science and Human Nutrition areas. The Center gives KSU Extension Agents throughout the state an efficient, available resource for them to answer consumer questions related to food science and human nutrition. The Center has become a vital resource for all Kansas Extension agents.

The Rapid Response Center is a valuable resource for all Kansas Extension agents. It is especially useful for new agents and for counties with one or no agent. It can be a valuable addition to any university Extension program, providing information to county faculty, and freeing up time for on-campus faculty.

As FCS agents we feel our work is made so much easier with Karen's rapid response to our many asked questions, we want to thank her for being a friend in so many different ways to each and everyone of us.

KEAFCS By-Laws - Approved Revisions, March 2012

These changes were adopted by the KEAFCS membership at the business meeting on March 8, 2012 in Wichita:

Under Article VII, Section 1, Dues:

ADD:

Student Member

A Student Member is a full time undergraduate or graduate student enrolled in a university or college studying Family Consumer Sciences or a related field. Student Members may receive awards, fellowships and grants as a team member with an Active Member but not as an individual. They may serve committees but they may not run for elected office, serve as committee chairs or as voting delegates. Payment of dues at the rate of one-half the current state and national dues will include membership in:

Kansas Extension Association of Family and Consumer Sciences National Extension Association of Family and Consumer Sciences

National Life Member

Any retired KEAFCS member who is not currently employed in the Extension system may upon a one time payment of three times the current national dues become a life member of the national NEAFCS organization. National life membership includes life membership in KEAFCS.

CHANGE:

State Life Member

Any former KEAFCS member who is otherwise not eligible for the honorary state life membership described in Article VI and who is not currently employed in the Extension system may upon a one-time payment of three times the current state dues, become a life member of the State organization. The dues will support KEAFCS activities. State life membership does not include life membership in NEAFCS.

Research & Studies: Chair - Debra Bolton, Southwest Area Extension Specialist

A comprehensive social and health study is in the reporting stage of completion. This study focused on Finney County, which has a 52% õminorityö population. Return rate on the multi-language (English, Spanish, Somali and Karen, a Burmese language) survey instrument was 10% of the total population. So far the results have been presented in several local venues, two state venues, and 2 national venues. A regional hospital that serves 26 counties in Southwest Kansas has adopted the results of the survey for its strategic plan among other human service organizations. Also, a weekly report from the survey has been reported in K-State Research and Extensionøs newsletter called, Tuesday Letter. The research team was led by Debra Bolton, PhD, Southwest Area Extension Specialist, FCS.

Three Extension Agents, FCS, are working toward their doctorates. Two are studying in Human Ecology with and emphasis in Family Studies and Human Services, and one in Education. Please support these three in continuing their education:

All FCS Extension professionals might consider certification as a family life educator. The National Council on Family Relations certifies those who work with families. Requirements include academic course work, professional development, and/or work experience in family life activities and teaching. NCFR also produces journals that may be of interest to you. Family Relations includes research on a variety of topics that related to families. For example, the February 2012 issue was devoted to balancing work and family. Other important topics, such as, working with families from other cultures and challenging behaviors in children, are other examples of the kinds of research happening among family practitioners.

On another note, the Community and Economic Development Program Focus Team has developed an extensive workshop on Board Leadership Training. The team will present much of the board training at Annual Conference for K-State Research and Extension, in October, 2012. The original board leadership training was offered via Adobe Connect to six sites across the state and was considered a great success in terms of measurable outcomes.
