The PILD conference was a celebration of the 150th anniversary of the Morrill Act which established the land-grant university system in 1862. Introduced by Justin Smith Morrill of Vermont, and signed by President Abraham

It assured that higher education would be available in all areas of the country and to all social classes. ## Research & Study Committee Update - submitted by Debra Bolton

There is a lot of research happening in SW Area, specifically in Kearny and Finney counties. The Kearny County research is complete and its results will be presented for the Change of Colors National Conference at the University of Missouri. Plans are to present it to interested participants in Kearny County as well. Three researchers (2 from K-State, and one from KU) are conducting studies in Finney County. My research is completed and analyses are underway. Preliminary results will be reported in June with further analyses to be completed by July, 2012.

All FCS Extension professionals might consider certification as a family life educator. The National Council on Family Relations (NFCR) certifies those who work with families. Requirements include academic coursework, professional development, and/or work experience in family life activities and teaching. For more information, talk to me, or send an email to info@ncfr.org. NCFR also produces journals that may be of interest to you. Family **Relations includes** research on a variety of topics that related to families. For example, the February 2012 issue

was devoted to balancing work and family. Other important topics, such as, working with families from other cultures and challenging behaviors in children, are other examples of the kinds of research happening among family practitioners. On another note, the Community and Economic Development Program Focus Team has developed an extensive workshop on Board Leadership Training. We just completed a successful pilot run of it in April via Adobe Connect. More information can be found by reaching Jennifer Wilson or Trudy Rice.
