- a. There was limited information on the web. The city website should be reconfigured to promote and market the city better.
- b. FANTASTIC city website.
- c. I visited the city website. It didn't have much information that someone moving there might way to know, schools and housing.
- d. Several websites. Couldn't find info on school rankings- outcomes.
- e. I found it very easy to find information about Blue Rapids online. I viewed their official website, www.bluerapids.org. Could use more photos on that site. For Blue Rapids attractions, I went to the Marshall County site.
- f. Easy to get, no difficulties.
- 1. <u>The "Five-Minute" Impression</u>: After taking a five-minute drive through the community without stopping, the following reactions were noted. The following observations were noted when entering the community from major entrances (signs, streetscapes, buildings, etc.)
 - a. This is a tale of two cities—one with beautiful housing, the other with substandard and dilapidated housing. The eastern entrance to the city was incredible. It left a very good impression with me.
 - b. Beautiful setting, interesting circular main "street," quite a few dumpy houses (sorry!)
 - c. I thought it was a nice small town and liked the ballfields, pool, fairgrounds all in the same area. The senior housing was nice. The fire department was very nice for a small town.
 - a. Small town in central Kansas trying to survive. Love the limestone buildings. Nice small town. New fire/police department building, but rest of area on highway could use some tidying up.
 - d. I found it to be a very neat and clean community. It looks like a good place to live. Good signage, well-maintained streets and building. I would love to see the little diner on the east side of town restored.
 - e. Pleasant appearance, Welcome sign, houses, some businesses.

2. Downtown Business Area

Describe the buildings, signs, infrastructure, etc. Explain what type of businesses you observed and give a description of the variety and quality of merchandise displayed. Describe the customer service received when you entered those retail businesses. (Were you greeted? Did you have to ask for assistance?)

- a. The downtown business area is in dire need of investment. The circle drive is nice, the new library addition is first rate, but the city needs to bring in new investment to revive a potentially great asset. We saw a library, bank, bar & grill and a number of vacant buildings.
- b. The bank and library were beautiful. It appeared that buildings were missing. Others were run down. We stopped at the Blue Rapids flower shop. It was great, but off the beaten path. We were not greeted; she was ringing another lady up. No assistance was given, but it was a small shop so none was really needed.
- c. I thought the buildings were well-kept, streets clean. I liked the circle main street with the park in the middle. We saw historical society, pharmacy, library, bank, diner, and city office, which the people were very friendly and helpful. We were greeted and they were very nice and helpful.
- d. Business area built around a circle. Limestone buildings. Oldest public Library west of the Mississippi. Glacier display. Bank, Library, Community Center/City office, trailer manufacturer, greenhouses. Friendly and helpful customer service.
- e. The downtown area is beautiful and the buildings well-maintained! Signage and infrastructure great! Flower and gift shop; plants, gifts, food. Bought a delicious jelly there and tomato plants. Antique shop—collectibles, food, housewares. Grocery nice selection. We were greeted, did not have to ask for assistance.
- f. Mostly older buildings but well maintained. Gas Station, grocery store, Dollar General. Grocery store had a large variety, deli and Subway Sandwich Shop. Displayed well. Was greeted and offered assistance.

What public amenities were available (drinking fountains, benches, public restrooms, etc.) Comment on appealing landscaping and streetscaping. Did you have difficulty finding parking? Could you access multiple services from where you parked?

- d. Benches in City Park and in the downtown circle. No parking issues. Landscaping around Presbyterian Church was beautiful.
- e. Found all of these (Didn't search out Wi-Fi)
- f. Neatly kept park in the middle of older businesses. City Hall and Community Center across the street with amenities and police department.

- a. The city has the Blue Valley nursing home. The setting was beautiful at the edge of town.

- c. We found a nursing facility in a sort of rural area which is probably nice and quiet for the elderly.

- f. Assisted living, nursing facilities, and income-based housing.

6. Housing

Give a brief description of the existing mix of housing stock. Does the local market have housing that would appeal to all income wages? What challenges do you see in regards to finding acceptable housing? (Neighborhoods, size, properties for sale, etc.)

- a. Blue Rapids is in dire need of quality housing. There are a good number of nice homes, but a bigger number of substandard homes that need to be demolished. Most good quality homes are sold without going on the market. In fact, we did not see any "for sale" signs in town.
- b. Such a mix. Some very dilapidated, some really nice.
- c. We found some nice housing and some not so appealing housing. No for sale or rent signs in sight.
- d. A mixed bag of housing and neighborhoods. Did not see any "for sale or For Rent" signs. Housing could be a problem.
- e. It looks like there are homes for all price ranges. The majority of the homes are in good repair. I went online to view houses for sale and the price range was \$52,000 to \$579,000.
- f. Wide variety of homes, most well-kept but some in need of repair.

What kind of rental properties did you observe for persons interested in building or simply living in the community prior to buying housing?

- a. There appeared to be very little quality housing for rent. We did not observe any for rent signs.
- b. Didn't notice any houses for sale or rent.
- c. Did not see any.
- d. Small apartment building (maybe former motel?) not too pleasing appearance. No rental signs.
- e. I didn't notice any rental properties but I'm sure they are there.
- f. Don't know. Fair housing discrimination information available.

7. Schools

Do the following schools appear to be adequate in size or do you see the use of temporary classrooms? Are the buildings and grounds well-maintained?

- a. The city has a K-3 grade school. Building appeared to be adequate. Grounds were immaculate.
- b. Yes, kids were outside playing. It looked like a nice facility and playground.
- c. There is a $3^{rd} 6^{th}$ grade school. Buildings and grounds were very nice.
- d. Grades 3-6 are in Blue Rapids. Nice, well-maintained buildings and grounds. K-2 in Waterville, 7-12 building is located between the two towns.
- e. Preschool, elementary and high school. All appear to be adequate and well maintained.
- f. Valley Heights School, Preschool, K-6. Well maintained.

- a. The city parks is a highlight in Blue Rapids. The setting is very nice and is unique due to its location.

- c. We were very welcomed at City Hall. They were very knowledgeable about the area.
- d. Nice city hall. Clerk very friendly and knowledgeable. Not sure about info available except word of mouth. City council meets once a month- 2nd Wed at 7pm.
- e. City Hall is housed in a newer building downtown. Very nice! Office staff were friendly and helpful. There were lots of brochures and information available. A nice meeting room, restrooms, water fountains and kitchen.
- f. City/town hall- well received. Display of pamphlets with information about the area. Chief of police and one officer happened to be in the city office, had a nice visit with them.

Police/fire protection:

- a. The city has a nice facility for both.
- b. Sooooo many bays. Wow!
- c. We were told 2 full-time officers and a new office in the fire department building.
- d. Police: 2-full-time; 5 part-time. Huge new building on the highway that houses fire and police. Had/have issue with tax financing on the building between city and township.

What are the biggest obstacles/challenges facing this community?

- a. Housing. Need a plan to market the town. Need branding at present. Blue Rapids is anonymous.
- b. Housing, so many businesses within city limits, like literally in the middle of residential houses. Distance from bigger city.
- c. More businesses. More land available for new housing as town seems to be surrounded by farm land.
- d. Not a heavily populated part of the state. Hwy 9 does run through the town, but feel most of the traffic is probably locals in the area. Don't believe they have many "new" visitors traveling that highway that might stop and check out the town. They need a reason for people to come.
- e. Bringing a few more businesses to the downtown area. Good, affordable daycare (may be there but I didn't see it). A good restaurant that people from out of town would drive to would be nice. Need good restaurant. Very few choices. We ate at Subway.
