The process

- Syracuse asked for First Impressions, we obtained Kinsley as its partner; 2:20 drive is a challenge.
- Marty Gleason received City Council approval and enlisted volunteers.
- I trained the volunteers about the visit and survey and took photos of Kinsley on May 23, 2018.
- Supplemental photos were added in December.
- Syracuse visitors came in three cars: May 6, June 9 and August 24 and returned three surveys.
- Results are presented tonight. (December 13)
- Kinsley uses the report to continue conversations and planning.



Why: First Impressions?

Feedback:

How does a first-time visitor view my town?

- Evaluate successes,
- Set goals and priorities for next steps.

If you don't agree with the observation:

- Be curious, Why does the visitor see it this way?
- Is the observation worth considering?
- What can we do to change it— or the perception?

Curiosity: A strong desire to know or learn something.



National Foundation for Carnival Heritage Center - Kinsley was home to a number of carnivals during the 1900s. This unique museum captures the spirit of entertainment from a simpler time. Located at 113 East 6th Street, contact John Ploger at 620-659-2201 to schedule a tour.



Pioneer (South) Park - The largest of Kinsley's parks offers activity for all. Playground and exercise equipment, two newly renovated ball diamonds (featuring a 1930's Limestone Grandstand), public swimming pool, a ½ mile walking path, public bathrooms and picnic facilities

in several spots. Located between 12th and 13th streets just off Hwy 183 on Kinsley's south side this place is getting better all the time (coming soon a 9 hole disc golf course).



Palace Theater - Built in 1917 this gem has been restored and updated by the E Team, a local volunteer group, to feature current movies on a weekly basis. Adult tickets are just \$5. Try getting that deal in the city. Located at 223 East 6th Street the Palace also has a stage for live play and

concert productions.

 Youth center-AWESOME! Lots of offices, some did look vacant though.











- Heard good things about the restaurant near the east edge of town, would eat there in the future.
- Not really, I didn't see even a café, just a deli. I am a sucker for small town cafes and typical hole-in-thewall restaurants, but I didn't notice one.





Most Positive Observations

- Small town feel, kids playing. People out working in yards.
- Nice residential neighborhoods appealing. Wide variety of housing – sizes, styles, etc. Impressive looking healthcare facilities. Downtown building infrastructure is appealing and has possibilities, but nobody's home! Acceptable grocery store.
- Willing volunteers, there is a great sense of community here.



Biggest Obstacles/Challenges

- Growth, Neighborhoods needing fixer uppers fixed up or demolished.
- The downtown is discouraging for first impressions.
 Likely would be the possible deal-breaker for me, no reason to go there. Having only one public restaurant (that I saw). Seems pretty inadequate for residents.
- Empty buildings: trying to fill some of the buildings and keeping the business you do have going.



6 Months from Now

What will you remember?

- Midway. Pretty neat!
- Positive: Nice neighborhoods, appears to have good healthcare facilities.
- Town is well-located within driving distance of larger towns.
- Negative: Downtown doesn't look vital.
- Empty buildings: trying to fill some of the buildings and keeping the business you do have going.


K-State Research and Extension's Community Vitality Team offers grant writing workshops for local communities.





Research on Brain Gain

Ben Winchester, Senior Research Fellow, U of MN

- Brain Gain (30-49 year olds moving to rural) is a "new trend" that has been happening since the 70's and no one is noticing or talking about it.
- Rural is in the middle of everywhere. You live one place, work another and play another. With transportation and internet, it's all accessible to you.
- People research a number of places before they move to a rural town.
- Only 1/3 of the people who move rural have a previous connection with that area.



Research on Brain Gain

- If you bring 7 people to a 700 citizen town every year in 10 years you'll have a 10% increase. It matters! It is a challenge with housing, but it is achievable.
- We are our own worst enemies. We have to monitor our customer service! It matters!
- Don't buy in to someone else's narrative.
- 1/5 of dollars come from transfer payments—not employers.





Research on Brain Gain

- Housing will be freed up as the baby boomers retire and move closer to medical services.
- Rural communities need retirement housing (not nursing facilities, but maintenance free) to retain seniors.
