The Process

- McFarland asked for First Impressions, Delphos agreed to be its partner; 1:45 min drive.
- I trained McFarland volunteers about the visit and survey on October 7 and took photos.
- 3 visitors from Delphos visited in September.
- Results presented at a community meeting Nov 14, 2024
- McFarland uses the results for further discussion and action plans.



Why: First Impressions?

Feedback:

How does a first-time visitor view my town?

- Evaluate successes,
- Set goals and priorities for next steps.

If you don't agree with the observation:

- Be curious, Why does the visitor see it this way?
- Is the observation worth considering?
- What can we do to change it— or the perception?

Curiosity: A strong desire to know or learn something.

Ben Winchester, Senior Research Fellow, U of MN We need to change the narrative about rural.

- Rural is changing, not dying.
- Brain Gain (30-49 year olds moving to rural) is a "new trend" that has been happening since the 70's.
- People research a number of places before they move to a rural town.
- Rural is in the middle of everywhere. You live one place, work another and play another. With transportation and internet, it's all accessible to you.



Ben Winchester, Senior Research Fellow, U of MN

- 46% of Kansas households moved between 1995-1999
- In a survey of newcomers to rural areas, the reasons they come are:
 - Simpler pace of life,
 - Safety and security,
 - Affordable housing,
 - Outdoor recreation,
 - Quality schools
 - "A job" isn't in the top 10 reasons.
- Communities can work together to attract newcomers and create quality of life for everyone.





- "In small towns everyone knows each other." false
- Get to know each other, invite them to a newcomers' meal.
- If you bring 3 people to a 300-citizen town every year in 10 years, you'll have a 10% increase. It matters! It is a challenge with housing, but it is achievable.
- We are our own worst enemies. We have to monitor our customer service and what we say. It matters.
- Don't say, "You have to live here twenty years to be an insider." And don't act like it either.



- 75% of rural homeowners are Baby Boomers and older. 30% are over 75.
- Housing will be freed up as the baby boomers retire and move closer to medical services.
- Rural communities need retirement housing (not nursing facilities, but maintenance free) to retain seniors.- Ben Winchester, Senior Research Fellow, University of Minnesota

McFarland offers a lovely residential area with easy-access to great schools, churches and businesses. Well-situated along Interstate 70 between Manhattan, Wamego and Topeka- just minutes away to regional employment and service centers!

The history and pattern of McFarland is the same of many small towns in Kansas. It came to exist because of the railroad and has experienced boom and bust. McFarland was founded in 1887 by S.R. Fairfield. McFarland was incorporated in 1903. The town was platted at the Rock Island Railroad point where the rail branched northwest to Denver and the Pacific coast, as well branching southwest toward the Gulf of Mexico. Railroad activity peaked in the 1920's then began to dwindle in the 1950's as railroad facilities were reduced in town. Although there is little business in McFarland, this small bedroom community is actually seeing a population increase in recent years.

Please drive through and consider this small town for your home or even small business! It's a nice, quiet town and home to 253 people!

The McFarland PRIDE organization manages the schedule and maintenance of the Baseball Diamond, helps with the fabulous city park, and hosts family friendly activities as various holidays throughout the year.



- Wi-Fi sign was easy to read at entrance.




















- There is only a post office. Other buildings are vacant.


Mc Farland is landlocked next to farm ground.



- One Church/Child Care Building was for rent












- Saw the TEAM sign at the north end of town.

Most Positive Observations

- Nice streets and sidewalks. Lots of very nice newer homes. Community Bingo. The majority of yards were neat and tidy.
- Very well-maintained streets and public buildings.
- Streets are well-maintained with little or no vandalism per city clerk. Patriotic, American pride is reflected in well-kept homes and yards. USA Flag flying. Many political signs and flags, all in good taste.



Biggest Obstacles/Challenges

- Probably McFarland's proximity to Alma, Wamego. This is a plus, being so close to medical facilities, restaurants, shopping, and amenities. But it's also a negative because people would live in Alma and Wamego and establish businesses in these towns. Perhaps lack of housing. Has McFarland explored building multiple housing for singles?
- No tax base, but property. It is a bedroom community.
- No retail businesses. Land locked due to no land to expand building houses. Retail was locked due to living in close proximity to larger towns offering industrial, retail, commercial.



Remote Work

- Now people have a choice, and millions of them are planning to move.
- "The pivot to remote work is the biggest, fastest transformation of the labor market since the World War II mobilization."
- Major cities will see the biggest out-migration: 20.6% of those planning to move are currently based in a major city.
- People are seeking less expensive housing: Altogether, more than half (52.5%) are planning to move to a house that is significantly more affordable than their current home.
- People are moving beyond regular commute distances: 54.7% of people are moving over two hours away or more from their current location, which is beyond daily or even weekly commuting distances for most.
