The process

- River Valley Extension Director John Forshee promoted First Impressions and suggested Washington and Wakefield as partners.
- Brandy Riggs received City Council approval (Feb 12, 2018) and enlisted volunteers.
- I trained the volunteers about the visit survey (Sept 18) and took Wakefield photos October 19.
- Washington visitors returned 5 surveys in September and October visits: on your compiled report.
- Results are presented tonight. (November 28)
- Wakefield uses the report to continue planning and conversations.



Why: First Impressions?

Feedback:

How does a first-time visitor view my town?

- Evaluate successes,
- Set goals and priorities for next steps.

If you don't agree with the observation:

- Be curious, Why does the visitor see it this way?
- Is the observation worth considering?
- What can we do to change it— or the perception?

Curiosity: A strong desire to know or learn something.



 Didn't realize there is no downtown area. Businesses along the highway could use a facelift.



Industrial Parks/Commercial

 We noticed a scheduled meeting about location of rock quarry. The Coop is located on the west side of the city which limits noise and dust in the city limits.

Health Care Services

- We did not see any health care services. Many who live in Wakefield work in other places: Clay Center, Abilene or Junction City.
- People travel to Clay Center for their physician services.

Wakefield Rehab and Care center appeared well-

maintained.

- There is a variety of both older and newer homes.
- Saw some homes for sale; very few, if any, for rent signs.
- There was housing for different income levels.
- There was a relatively well-maintained trailer park.



Faith/Religion

 Churches are active in Wakefield. Generally, the buildings appear to be well-maintained.







Faith/Religion

- We saw a poster for a church pancake feed.
- Signage could direct visitors more easily to the churches.







- Scouts, 4-H, Lions Club, Kansas PRIDE.
- Organizational activity: Saw the Lions Pancake Feed,
 Streets marked for 10k, PRIDE.
- Seemed like many of the clubs came from the school.
- Appears to be a civically engaged community.





Public Infrastructure

- Differing opinions of street maintenance, but overall impression is of a "well-maintained" town.
- No comments about walkability... can children walk home from school on sidewalks?







 City Hall is a little off the beaten path, so a sign or two directing people there, might be helpful.

The city clerk was extremely helpful, a great

ambassador for Wakefield.







- We noticed efforts to engage citizens in government:
 - A white board to place an item on the City
 Council agenda.
 - A white board that noted progress on city projects. That was a very effective visual.



Fire, EMS and Police Services

 The fire house is on Main Street and could be updated. I saw a patrol vehicle on west side of town

at a home.

ISO Public Protection Classification

Most U.S. insurers of home and business properties use Insurance Services Office's (ISO) Property Protection Classification (PPC) in calculating premiums. In general, the price of insurance in a community with a goop PPC is lower than in a community with a goop PPC, assuming all other factors are equal.

A community's PPC depends on:


- 1. Emergency communications systems, including facilities for the public to report fires, staffing, training, certification of telecommunicators, and facilities for dispatching fire departments.
- 2. The fire department, including equipment, staffing, training, and geographic deployment of fire companies
 3. The water supply system, including the inspection and flow testing of hydrants and a careful evaluation of the amount of available water compared with the amount needed to suppress fires








- Very neat historical building.

Most Positive Observations

- Campgrounds and Lake.
- Overall, a very nice community. People were very friendly, and the community looked very nice.
- Perfect location next to the lake. How clean the town was and how there was obvious pride in the town due to all the well-maintained homes.
- Wakefield is a city that is generally well-maintained.
 It is neat. The parks and greenspace make it inviting.
- Very clean housing, beautiful murals on several different buildings.



Biggest Obstacles/Challenges

- Street repair, campground clean up from recent flood.
- There is no grocery store. The lake is a great tourist attraction, but there are no jobs at the lake. Since there are no jobs, they might have trouble getting people to move to town.
- Lack of businesses.



Biggest Obstacles/Challenges

- All small towns face challenges. For Wakefield, many residents live there, but work other places. That makes it difficult to maintain some services, such as a grocery store.
- How to capitalize on what the reservoir brings to the city and determine possible services that help the summer guests as well as the permanent residents.


K-State Research and Extension's Community Vitality Team offers grant writing workshops for local communities.

- 91% have increased confidence to develop the elements of a successful grant.











Research on Brain Gain

Ben Winchester, Senior Research Fellow, U of MN

- Brain Gain (30-49 year olds moving to rural) is a "new trend" that has been happening since the 70's and no one is noticing or talking about it.
- Rural is in the middle of everywhere. You live one place, work another and play another. With transportation and internet, it's all accessible to you.
- People research a number of places before they move to a rural town.
- Only 1/3 of the people who move rural have a previous connection with that area.



Research on Brain Gain

- If you bring 7 people to a 700 citizen town every year in 10 years you'll have a 10% increase. It matters! It is a challenge with housing, but it is achievable.
- We are our own worst enemies. We have to monitor our customer service! It matters!
- Don't buy in to someone else's narrative.
- 1/5 of dollars come from transfer payments—not employers.





Research on Brain Gain

- Housing will be freed up as the baby boomers retire and move closer to medical services.
- Rural communities need retirement housing (not nursing facilities, but maintenance free) to retain seniors.
