Advocacy Efforts for Local In-Home & Center-Based Providers

- + Letters of support were sent to U.S. Senators Jerry Moran and Roger Marshall as well as Congressman Tracey Mann to expand reimbursement rates for all providers for the CACFP food program.
- + Working with state representatives and senators to address cost of liability insurance for providers
- + Connected area providers with regulation standards review that was conducted earlier this year
